1. Sir Francis Drake carried out the second circumnavigation of the world in 1577 in his flagship, the Pelican, which he later renamed the \_\_\_\_\_. It weighed about 100 tons.
2. Admiral Horatio Nelson's flagship, the \_\_\_\_\_, vanquished the French as well as the Spanish fleets at the battle of Trafalgar which took place near the coast of Spain on 21 October 1805. The ship has been preserved and is on view today in Portsmouth, England.
3. In 1819, the \_\_\_\_\_ became the first ship to employ steam power to cross the Atlantic Ocean. It demonstrated the practicability of steam navigation on the ocean by using a small steam engine and pinewood fuel supply.
4. On 14–15 April 1912, the \_\_\_\_\_, the world's largest and most luxurious ocean liner back then, disappeared into the icy depths of the North Atlantic on its maiden voyage and took the lives of around 1,500 people including men, women, and children.
5. The \_\_\_\_\_ was the first of two largest battleships built by the Germans during World War II. Launched in 1939, the ship displaced 52,600 tons, mounted eight 15-inch (38-cm) guns, and had a speed of 30 knots.
